#### Jesus' Hour of Glory

Jesus answered them, "The time has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.... Now my soul is troubled. And what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, this is the reason I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name! ... And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." (John 12:23, 27-28, 32)

It was June 18, 1940. The German armies under the leadership of Adolf Hitler were advancing in both directions throughout continental Europe. Now, after an arduous Battle of France, the significant nation of the Allied Forces was seeking armistice with Nazi Germany. The Battle of France had ended, and it was obvious to everyone that the Germans would now turn all the fury of its *Blitzkrieg* against Britain. Now Winston Churchill, now just over a month into office as British prime minister, was delivering a speech to the House of Commons. Though matter appeared bleak and troubled days loomed on the horizon, Churchill delivered a speech filled with British defiance and iron-faced resolve in the face of the Battle of Britain to come. Though uncertain how victory against the Germans would be achieved, he justified his confidence in victory all the same. The famous closing line of his speech goes thus:

Let us therefore brace ourselves to our duties, and so bear ourselves that, if the British Empire and its Commonwealth last for a thousand years, men will still say, "This was their finest hour."

Defining hours so often come in the darkest of times. This would prove true in the British resolve and resistance from this point forward in World War II.

No hour in all of world history could be darker than those hours when the Son of God hung in darkness upon the cross, his life ebbing away under the weight of the world's sin and the boundless fury of God the Father's righteous judgment. Indeed, what period in all human history could be worse than when all humanity turned against its Savior, rejected him, and nailed him to a cross? His own people Israel had rejected him as the Christ. They had turned him over to the Romans so that Pilate could sign off on his execution. His disciples has betrayed him, fled from him, and disowned him. Even all the tears of those who mourned for him and the voices that dissented from the proceedings of that Friday could do him no good. On the first century Friday, we—humanity as a whole—killed God.

Jesus didn't see it entirely that way, however. Sure, the rejection

by Jews and Romans alike, the abandonment of the apostles, the betrayal of all humanity remained. But it was for this very hour that Jesus came into the world. This was his hour of glory, the hour when he would be delivered up and his life offered for the sins of the world. This was his finest hour.

The events of John 12 take place during Holy Week, perhaps on Tuesday, but we can't know for certain. Nevertheless, Good Friday was looming, and Jesus was determined to go to the cross to fulfill his work as the Christ. While Jesus is in the temple, some Greeks come with this request, "We would like to see Jesus." In this moment Jesus breaks in and says, "Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified."

The concept of "Jesus' Hour" is a thrilling, foreshadowing theme that looms throughout John's Gospel. Four previous times in chapters 2-8 John mentions how Jesus' hour or Jesus' time had not yet come, not in chapter 2 at the wedding of Cana, nor chapter 7 when his brothers challenge him to show himself to the world at the festival at Jerusalem, and not in chapters 7 or 8 when the Jews try to seize him while he is in Jerusalem.

But now his hour had come, when Jewish hostility was at its height and Greeks had come to seek him. Now, only days away from the cross, Jesus says, "Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.... And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." Dark though his crucifixion would be, this was Jesus' hour of glory, the hour appointed from eternity by God the Father, the moment in all history when God would draw all people to himself through his beloved Son's atoning death on the cross. Nothing would deter Jesus from his goal. He himself would not shrink back from it, but prayed, "Father, the hour has come; glorify your name!" And in this way God would glorify his name, glorify his Son, and bring salvation to the ends of the earth. Of course, the hour of glory would continue into Jesus' exaltation, his victory over sin and Satan, his resurrection, and his ascension to God's right hand. Now Jesus' hour of glory lasts into his eternal kingdom.

This March we meditate again upon Jesus' hour of glory during Holy Week, March 24-31. As we journey through his passion to the cross and empty tomb, let us find joy and hope in the hour of Christ's glory as we again see that "this was his finest hour."
