

Opening Thought

The messengers returned to Jacob and reported, "We came to your brother Esau. Now he is coming to meet you, and he has four hundred men with him."

So Jacob was terrified and very distressed. He divided the people who were with him, as well as the flocks, and the herds, and the camels, into two camps. He said, "If Esau comes to one camp and strikes it, then the other camp will escape." Jacob said, "God of my father Abraham and God of my father Isaac, the Lord, who said to me, 'Return to your country and to your relatives, and I will do good for you,' I am not worthy of even a bit of all the mercy and all the faithfulness that you have shown to your servant, for I crossed over this Jordan with just my staff, and now I have grown into two camps. Please deliver me from the hand of my brother, from the hand of Esau, for I am afraid that he will come and strike me and the mothers, as well as the children.

You said, 'I will surely do good for you and make your descendants like the grains of sand of the sea, which cannot be counted because there are so many."

Jacob spent that night there and selected a gift for Esau his brother from the possessions he had with him. (Genesis 32:6-13)

Twenty years had gone by. It had been twenty years since Jacob had tricked his brother Esau and deceived his father Isaac into getting the special blessing. Esau vowed to murder his brother for such deception. Jacob had fled the land of Canaan for the land of Haran. After being away for 20 years, God commanded Jacob that it was time to go back home. The words recorded above are set on the eve of his reunion with his brother Esau. It is also a Bible lesson your students studied this very week!

A pastor in Bible class once said, "Prayers have hands and feet." The Christian will put his/her hands together in prayer and petition our faithful God. That prayer will cling to God's promises that he makes in his Word. Then the Christian uses his/her feet to take action. The sinful Christian may make mistakes but uses his/her wisdom to decide a course and seeks God to bless that decision.

Jacob demonstrated that point well. He put his hands together in prayer. He even physically wrestled with a man (God himself) throughout his prayer. Then he took action. He had already divided his family and possessions into two groups. He also carefully prepared a generous gift for his brother, Esau, and even wisely divided that gift into five smaller gifts vs. one large gift. Finally, God blessed it. Esau and Jacob reconciled their differences.

In our lives as Christians, we also face many difficult decisions. We get a new job offer. We have to decide on a high school for our children. We wonder whether to speak up when we see someone close doing something wrong. We wonder how to discipline our children when they have sinned. Sometimes we have to make decisions that we know are going to affect the lives for many other people. At such times, we can feel *terrified and distressed* like Jacob was that night so long ago.

Dear Christians, remember that prayers have "Hands and feet." When facing such decisions, put your hands together in prayer. Cling to God's promises that he makes in his Word. Know that God is faithful to those promises! Then use your feet to take action. God has given you human wisdom to weigh all facets to those difficult choices you face. Make a decision that lines up with God's Word, and then ask him to bless that decision. Self-doubt may haunt. Some may question your wisdom. Seek God to bless the choice that you have made. Be confident in his promises that he has made to you.

Indeed, he who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also graciously give us all things along with him? (Romans 8:32)



When one hears the name Metcalf, it likely seems familiar to many. That is because Aaron is the oldest of three children, and a son to a former teacher at St. Mark, Laura Metcalf. Aaron was born in Ashland and bounced around Wisconsin a lot as a child. Finally, the Metcalf's settled in Eau Claire about the time that Aaron began high school. He attended Memorial High School in the late 1990's-early 2000's. After graduating from Memorial, he entered the Marine Corp for 4 years. He then took a break for five years and re-enlisted in the Army in 2010. He has worked many jobs in the Army including a corrections officer working with inmates on death row. She also works part time at a local coffee shop in Eau Claire.
